"It is a great privilege for us to utter these holy words, Avi. They are the Divinely inspired outpouring of the emotions generated by the experience of the miracles of the splitting of the Yom Suf. Rav Shimshon Refael Hirsch cites three words from the preliminary verses which crystallize experience. 'Vayosha' (Hashem saved), 'vayiru', and 'vayaminu' [(the people) feared and trusted (Hashem)]. Fear of Hashem relates to His 'middas ha'din' (attribute of strict judgment). This was demonstrated by the annihilation of the world military superpower called Mitzrayim. Trust in Hashem, the way we relate to the 'middas ha'rachamim' (attribute of mercy), was evoked by the salvation of Klal Yisrael, a nation of slaves who had been tortured and abused for centuries. Hashem saved us, by freely wielding His infinite power and applying both of these middos at the same time.

"Indeed, Avi. Our relationship with our Father in Heaven can be as deep as we make it. We should take a lesson from the Kriyas Yom Suf and fear Hashem at all times. However, we can trust in His mercy that He is always taking care of us in the very best way possible. We can rely upon Him, because He is in supreme control of everything, and can accomplish whatever He wants at any time.'

"Awesome.

"Yes, Avi. The Shira continues, 'Hashem is my strength and song, and this was my salvation' (Shemos 15:2). Rav Hirsch illuminates this verse with a brilliant insight. Why was I saved? Because Hashem was my strength and song. I ascribed no power to myself, for my body was weak. Rather, my spirit was strong and receptive. I accepted Hashem's kindness and



performed His will. I proved that I was a fitting instrument to demonstrate His Divine Supervision, which shapes the lives of men and nations."

"What a privilege; what an honor!"

"Yes, we had great merits, Avi. The verse continues by relating that we can still bring Hashem close to us. 'This is my G-d, and I will be a dwelling place for Him.' The Targum Unkelos, Rashi, and the Sforno explain that we built a dwelling place for the Shechina (Divine Presence) among us. Rav Hirsch broadens this con-

I am ready, Abba. How do I do it?" "Firstly, Avi, study this Shira and say it every day with kavannah (proper intent and concentration). Try to perceive the miracles, and evoke the emotions of fear and trust in the Almighty. Relive the Kriyas Yom Suf! Carry this humility and gratitude to Hashem into your daily life, thoughts, and deeds. You will gradually transform yourself into a holy vessel fitting to bear the Divine Presence. Hashem will choose his humble servant Avi, and the glorious dwelling place for His Shechina!'
